

Location: The University of New Brunswick's two main campuses are located in Fredericton and Saint John, New Brunswick.

A little about us: The University of New Brunswick is Canada's oldest one of Universities, dating back to 1785. The Department of Psychology was established as an independent academic unit in 1966. It is located in Keirstead Hall in Fredericton and in Hazen Hall in Saint John. Forty-three graduate students and over 200 undergraduate psychology majors attend UNB. Currently, the Department houses 25 full-time faculty members (16 on the Fredericton Campus and 9 on the Saint John Campus) and many clinical associates. Several faculty members are recognised nationally and internationally for their research contributions and clinical expertise and a number of faculty members and graduate students have secured external funding from like NSERC sources SSHRC.

Our programs: UNB offers a B.A. and B.Sc. psychology program, as well as a Biopsychology specialisation. Undergraduate students can choose to major or honour in psychology. At the graduate level, UNB has an MA Experimental program (based in Saint John), a 5-year integrated MA/Ph.D. Experimental-Applied program, and a 5-year integrated MA/Ph.D. Clinical program (based in Fredericton). The goal of the Experimental and Experimental-Applied programs is to prepare students for a career as researchers and teachers in psychology. These programs provide flexibility to students, allowing them to pick seminar courses that best fit their research interests. The Clinical program places emphasis on both acquiring clinical skills and conducting high quality research. A generalist model is used so that clinical students graduate with the ability to work with both children and adults. As such, all clinical students are required to complete skills-courses that deal with child and adult therapy and assessment as well as to complete both an

adult and child practicum. The clinical program is accredited by the Canadian Psychological

A unique element of both of the Ph.D. programs at UNB is the mandatory teaching apprentice-Students ship. in the Experimental-Applied and Clinical streams are required to teach one psychology course, and are given feedback by an assigned supervisor. This provides students with an excellent opportunity to develop teaching skills and experience, which improves both their education and their CV!

Faculty members and students research a wide variety of topics. Some of these areas include depression, human sexuality, feminist perspectives, criminal justice, animal learning, psychopharmacology, perception, autism, problem gambling, pain, infant/adolescent development, and cognitive neuroscience. Research at both the undergraduate and graduate level takes place in our well-equipped laboratories in Keirstead Hall, Hazen Hall, and in the community.

Psychology Societies: The Undergraduate Psychology Society (UPS) is an important component of undergraduate life for many psychology students at UNB. The UPS enables students

ment through participation in both social and academic activities, while fostering valuable connections with faculty members. The Psychological Association of Graduate Students (PAGS) provides an equivalent source of information, support, and social activities for those students in the graduate programs.
